Fly Fishing International Fly of the Month February 2009 March Brown Emerger

The March Brown is an important spring mayfly. It is a reasonably sized insect so it is easy to imitate. Monica Mullen was tying this pattern at the 2008 N.W. Fly Tying & Fly Fishing Expo in Albany, Oregon. Many people I talked to during the Expo raved about the March Brown in their local streams.

The March Brown (species Rithrogena) is a clinger mayfly, so they are found in fast flowing streams. They are widely distributed through the western U.S. and Canada along the Pacific Coast to British Columbia inland to the Eastern slopes of the Rocky Mountains. Notable rivers around the western North America include McKenzie and middle fork of the Willamette in coastal Oregon, Yellowstone, Madison, the Henry's Fork, Rock Creek (Montana) and Crowsnest (Alberta). There are some populations of Rhithrogena elsewhere, but hatches are not reliable.

Oregon seems to have the earliest hatches in late February to March with higher altitude streams in the Rocky Mountains or Canada as late as mid-May. According to references, in faster streams the nymphs hang on to the bottom while the dun emerges underwater. Finally, the emerging dun is released from the bottom and floats to the surface. At the surface the dun's wings need to dry before it can fly off. This is a great time for trout as they seem to delight in feeding on drifting emergers. The angler can take advantage of this and float the fly behind boulders, near eddies, along under banks and log jams. Use a floating line and a dead drift.

Material List:

Hook: Dry fly size 8 Thread: Black 6/0 Tail: Antron yarn, tan Rib: Ultra wire, brassy, red Body: Peacock herl dyed red Wing: Deer hair Thorax: Hairtron, dark brown

Tying steps:

1. Start thread a little more than an eye width behind the eye, and wind back to the bend.

2. Tie on Antron yarn for tail. Wind thread rearward around the bend so the tail slopes downward a little. Then wind forward to about two eye widths behind the eye.

3. Tie on the wire rib and wind thread rearward over it to a little behind the bend. Bring thread forward to the bend. Keep the rib on top of the hook. Leave thread at bend.

4. Tie three peacock herls at bend and wind thread over them to a point about 2/3rds shank length in front of the bend.

5. Wrap peacock herls forward to the thread, secure and trim excess.

6. Counter wrap the rib, secure and trim excess with cheap scissors. Don't use the sharp points of your good scissors. "Counter wrap" means to wrap the wire in a direction opposite to how the herl was wrapped.

7. Take a small bunch, a little more than match stick, of deer hair, clean out the under fur and stack it. Tie the bundle at front of peacock herl with tips pointing backward. Trim flared hair at the 1/3rd shank length back from the eye. Wind thread over the butts.

8. Put dubbing on thread and build up thorax. Use two layers to get a large enough thorax. It should be fuzzy to stand out more than the body.

9. Grab deer hair and bring it forward over the dubbing. Tie it down right behind the eye. Hold up the deer hair and whip finish between the deer hair and the eye.

Closing comments: If you are near a stream that has March Browns in it be sure to tie a few of Monica's emergers to be ready for the hatch. The swift water habitat of a March Brown will make every fish feel like a monster. Always release the fish carefully so they can play with your fly another day.

Tai Chi

John Muir during his pilgrimages into the High Sierra's and study of the natural world, became aware of the interconnectedness of everything in this world. "When we try to pick out anything by itself, we find it hitched to everything else in the universe."- John Muir. Humanity from its beginning, has strived to make sense/understand life. Like John Muir, our early ancestors also studied nature to find answers, they followed the stars, listened to the oceans, dug into the earth, and studied animals, to learn how they survived and thrived. They too understood that interconnectedness of all things was paramount to our survival. Those wise men went even deeper than John Muir and defined that connectedness and created symbols that illustrated and teach this interrelationship. Many of those symbols are still used to this day, one that most of us are familiar with is the Tai Chi symbol (a) or the yin and yang as it is referred to in the western world.

The circle represents the whole, be it the world or the universe, the top of symbol represents the sky and the bottom earth. The clear section or fish as they are sometimes referred to is yang, dynamic energy, the shaded area, or dark fish is yin, passive energy. Within each fish is its opposite energy (the small circles of light and dark). Life moves in a circle, our planets orbit around the sun, the changing of the seasons, conception, birth, life and finally death. The fishes in motion represent movement, change as one always flows into the other. Rest becomes action, night becomes day, life becomes death, breath in (yin) and breath out (yang). Love and hate, joy, and sorrow, progressive and conservative. In turns they can be in opposition, or complimentary, within each they always carry the essence of the other. In all cases they are dependent on each other and together they make a whole. Each gives meaning to the other. We know love because there is hate, we know peace because of war, there would be no joy without sorrow, no action without rest.

In our day-to-day rush to get something accomplished we have over emphasized Yang and we have deemphasized Yin. An athlete pumps iron to build muscle, that exercise tears the muscle, it is sleep and rest that heals and rebuilds the muscle, making it stronger. A cup is only useful because of the empty space that holds the liquid. A house is a home because of the empty space held with-in. Earths winters allow rest and rejuvenation for rebirth and growth. Prayer and meditation allow spiritual growth. Each new project requires research and planning before construction. A fish holds in soft water to be able to feed in the fast water that delivers food. Outside time and away time, recharges us and make us more productive at work. Soft overcomes hard. Water erodes rock. Patience overcomes difficulty.

Fly-fishing teaches and employs all these truths. A fly rod enables us to cast a line further because it is yang with flexible yin properties, a fly-line is soft/yin, but its yang portion is firm enough to transfer energy, a fly is light enough to be cast and delivered but hard enough to hook a fish. All use yin and yang to work. As casters, we need to find that balance of hard and soft to cast affectively. Too much body inflexibility and power shorten our cast, too much softness and too little power causes a collapsed in delivery. Both yin (soft) and yang (hard) need to be in balance to move and effectively deliver a fly.

The catching of a fish is yang, the circle is made whole as yin is embraced and the fish is returned to the water. Mankind seeks absolutes where there is none. All that is, is necessary, each completes the whole, male and female, good and evil, love and hate, rich and poor, whole, and broken. All is in transition, from yin to yang on and on. In my lifetime (72 years) the Democratic party and the Republican party have become the other, at my birth the Republican party was the progressive party, and the Democrats were conservative. Today they identify as their opposite. As time moves and the world turns, the parties will morph again. Change is evident in the tai chi symbol itself; it has changed from its early beginnings (it morphed again (it reached its modern appearance it). As individuals we have our own dark and light sides, many times in our lifetimes we fight and doubt ourselves. Pointing our fingers and claiming one is better than the other is unproductive. We all have good and bad, pretty, and ugly, smart, and not so smart, rich, and poor. They each play a part in making us whole.

No system of government is always right and true, each have strength and weakness, democracy, socialist, capitalism, communism, fascism, were based all upon a hope for better, a noble ideal, but all have been corrupted by human frailties.

Our forefathers were just men, who were both good and had failings. When they created the U.S. Constitution, they soon realized that to get it passed, they could not set down hard and fast rules, that ambiguity allows the constitution to work. Systems that do not allow space fail. If the fish can never fight free, it would not be a sport and we would soon lose interest. The fish that most fishermen remember the most, are the ones that got away. Those loses, make our catches that much sweeter.

Action (yang) and inaction (yin) or doing and not doing is a struggle we all face. Should we or shouldn't we intervene. Too often we feel that we need to do something, but more often, not doing is the best outcome. Most problems given time and space will resolve themselves. In fishing, inaction promotes our productivity, catching. Constant casting keeps the fly off the water resulting in less time fishing. Too much movement of a fly chases away the fish. Longer drifts provide more presentation time to the fish. Too soon of a hook set, results in pulling your fly away from the fish. Patience (yin) is essential to productive fishing. So too in life, an over aggressive salesman drives away a customer, a too clingy lover drives away a partner. Too much force spoils a cast. When we are in balance, we flow with life exerting the right amount of effort provides the best results. Space and emptiness are vital to all efforts and endeavors. There is no sound without the medium of air space, a skin stretched over a hoop or drum needs air to produce sound, a guitar uses the emptiness of its body to give depth to its notes. Planets, moons, and stars need space to move, workers need space to do their jobs well. Micro-managing impedes work. Breaks refresh and reenergize us. When yin and yang are in balance that is when we are the most productive.

No effort by man is needed by nature for it to work effectively and efficiently. We are most beneficial when we do nothing at all. Our mostly well intentions efforts, lead to more problems than solution. My discussion here on Tai Chi is a miniscule introduction to a deep and rich philosophy to help comprehend all the dynamics and interactions of life, there is wealth of information available if you wish to learn more. Your journey through life is yours and your alone, we each are responsible for our own growth. True knowledge is earned by the individual that does the hard work to learn.

The people I admire the most are those that look at the mountains with appreciation and not with the need to own them. Step outside and embrace this garden of Eden.
