# Fly Fishing International Fly of the Month April 2009

#### **EMERGENT SPARKLE CADDIS**

Spring is the time when we all look for the great hatches of mayflies, stoneflies, midges and most important for many of us caddis flies. Gary LaFontaine and his team studied caddis flies, and his book Caddisflies is the standard on the subject. He describes many fly patterns to imitate caddis species. Two of those are Deep Pupa and Emergent Pupa. If you have an opportunity to read Caddisflies do it. There is much there to help you be a better fly angler. You will also see there are many more great patterns and many variations of the Deep Pupa and Emergent Pupa patterns.

Ellen Clark from Fort Washakie, WY tied several LaFontaine patterns at the 2009 East Idaho Fly Tying Expo, Idaho Falls, Idaho, April 16-17, 2009. While there are many variations available, this is one she likes to tie and fish. Zelon or Antron have a trilobal (three sided) fiber structure which has many advantages. Does it make good flies? You become a believer when you read pages 32-39 in Caddisflies. Statements like: "...in clear water the Sparkle Caddis Pupa drew the attention of trout three and a half feet away, while in the same situation a standard pupa drew the attention of fish no farther than a foot away." and "The Emergent Pupa...on the stream was roughly three times better than a fly lacking the imitation of an air sack,..." It doesn't clump or matt like other materials. It makes the fly carry air bubbles, and "The Emergent, hanging half I and half out of the water, kicks off a constant stream of bubbles." This was part of the patterns unexpected effectiveness. At times the Emergent Pupa even broke selective feeding cycles. What more do you want?

Fish feeding on emergers are often mistakenly thought to be feeding on adults. Several years ago on the Missouri River I watched a couple of fly anglers fishing over a bunch of rising fish. Since they were fishing the water I desired I watched them from a high spot. Through binoculars I could see the actively rising fish, and their floating flies drifting along untouched. However, most important I could see adult caddis floating unscathed for several hundred feet before they took flight. After the frustrated anglers left, they caught no fish, my friend and I went down and proceeded to hook and release many fish on pupa and nymph imitations. How do you fish the Emergent Sparkle Caddis? Read pages 99 – 114 in Caddisflies for a complete discussion, but I'll try to condense it a little. First is the dead drift approach. The fly is kept awash in the surface film where a trout can porpoise and eat it. For the caddis that does not ride quietly on the surface Gary recommends "the stutter and drift method," which is more active. Put a slack line curve cast up and across with the fly landing downstream of the line. Then make a quick mend before the fly starts to drag. The mend should do no more than make the fly stutter sideways a little. Release a little line to extend the drift. Some species of caddis Gary calls runners or paddlers; Canadians call them traveling sedges. These caddis move across the surface more or less in a straight line and either take off or are recycled into trout with an explosive rise. Grease the fly, and retrieve it with long pulls to move it across the water surface. I have also watched caddis swim around in circles before taking off, but I have never figured a way to move the fly like that. Enough talk, let's tie it.

Materials list: Hook: Dry Fly hook Thread: 6/0 brown

Bubble or over body: Micro Zelon, a new product, was used to tie the pictured fly, but Zelon or

Antron yarn are normally used, tan or caddis gold Underbody: Mole hair and Quick Fingers Touch Dubbing

Head: Dubbed mole or peacock

#### Tying steps:

- 1. Start thread about mid shank, and wind rearward to the bend which on most regular dry fly hooks is a point right over the barb.
- 2. Attach two clumps of Zelon or Antron at the bend of the hook. Place one bundle of Zelon or Antron on each side of the hook. As you tie, try to spread the fibers around the hook. Antron yarn might need to be combed out to fluff it enough for a good over body.
- 3. Ellen uses a variety of colors for the underbody, but on this fly she used mixed mole and Quick Fingers Touch Dubbing. Most tiers put a tacky dubbing wax on the thread and just touch the thread with a dubbing ball. She said that the touch technique was developed by Gary LaFontaine. Don't roll it down like making a tight noodle. Note, about one quarter shank length is uncovered.
- 4. Bring the bunches of Anton forward along the sides of the hook. Put a couple of not too tight thread winds just a front of underbody. Use a bodkin to pull out and bulk up the over body. Try to keep the over body evenly distributed around the hook.
- 5. At this point you can put wing pads on the sides of the over body. Tie in dark soft hackles parallel to hook shank no more than three quarters shank length long.

Sometimes a small bunch of lighter colored deer hair is added for a wing. Wrap mole fur dubbing or peacock herls for a head.

Closing comments: Every fly angler needs this and other Gary LaFontaine patterns in their fly box. They are easy to tie, and from the reports they are almost magic for catching trout. Then go out and fish them.

#### **Driving into the Dawn**

Inkiness of night saturates the world; to compensate for low overnight temperatures the trucks, heater is cranked all the way. Scrolling through music on my phone, my finger stops at Joe Bonamassa, his warm music (rich acoustic guitar blues), thrums from the truck's speakers, between the cab heater and the music, comfortable warmth settles in. So began my journey into this day's new dawn.

Starting a journey before dawn is hard wired into our DNA. The coming of light (dawn) is the beginning of all things. Our ancestors greeted the dawn with awe and reverence. The return of light eased their fear of things that go bump in the night. It brought warmth, promoted growth, and gave life. Its importance reverberates through our lives. We bury our dead facing the rising sun. Native cultures, faced their door and entrances of their homes and shelters facing East. Ancient constructs of seasonal timekeeping were laid down upon sunrise's first



light at dawn. It's symbolism, pervades our books and cinematic stories, our heroes and saviors arrive at dawn. Hope and dawn are paired in our physique. For humanity the transient light that precedes dawn is the harbinger of change. "Faith is the bird that feels the light and sings when the dawn is still dark." – Rabindranath Tagore

As humanity spread to all the corners of this earth, they started their journey before dawn to maximize daylight hours to ensure their survival. I too prefer to start my journeys before the dawn, but not for just pragmatic reasons of maximum use of daylight hours to accomplish tasks or my miles traveled in a day. There is a peacefulness in avoiding rush hour traffic, watching the sun rise and witnessing the birth of a new day, the awaking of life as light returns, hearing the first calls of birds, witnessing the rising of mist from night cooled pastures as the sun warms the air. Sun rise is a sensual experience.

Witnessing sunrise is a tangible reward that joins the unenumerable sensual experiences that make outdoor activities like fishing and camping addictive. Lights promise of revitalization is evident in earths landscape as well. This simple line by Heraclitus on nature encapsulates that reflection – "No man ever steps in the same river twice, for it is not the same river and he is not the same man." New beginnings and change allow us to grow and become one with the world around us, in this era nature disconnect, this is more important than ever.

As fisherman and outdoor lovers can attest, the following experiences are just a few things the pull us back,

again and again and reinforce our connection with nature.

The weight, pressure and pull of the river water on your legs as you wade, breaks the bonds of separation between man and earth. The bite of cold as you climb out of your sleeping bag, those that repeat this experience often enough, learn to dress from the top down. The sound of a boiling pot of water and the smell of (Steve's) fresh brewed coffee pulling you out of your cot. That first sip and the burst of flavor on your tongue, as the warmth spreads from a cradled enamel cup into your hands. The raise and turning of your head at the snap and crack of braking limbs, as a heard of elk pass through an alder bottom. The mesmerizing site and sound of Elk making a river crossing. The water spray, as their hooves shatters its liquid



surface. The thrum of Ruffed grouse in mating season, causing you to pause and scan the forest. The sound of wind as it passes through the meadow grass or the treetops, the wind through the treetop, often mimics the sound of flowing water.

The jerk of your rod on a take, and its dance as the steelhead tries to win its freedom, each jump sending shock wave through your soul. Reaching into the water and grasping the steelheads tail, then releasing it with a swift nod, and thank you as it swims away. A small reverence for the gift given and received. The sound of an axe strike on wood and its return echo as you process rounds into firewood. Shedding your jacket, as loosened muscles warm from the effort. The pop and crackle of a campfire and the pungent smell of smoke that warms you on frosty mornings and cool evenings. The sweet taste of (Sean's) firewood coal cooked, and alder smoked salmon or trout. The sound of thunder and a whiff of ozone as lighting splits the sky.

The intoxicating smell of sagebrush after a desert rain. A freshening down canyon breeze on a warm summer evening. The perfume of dampened dust and rain-struck grass. A sip of scotch and laughter around a campfire while dragging your fold up chair to evade smoke and sparks. Starry night skies peppered with falling stars and satellites. Rainy nights as you huddle beneath a tarp, tight to campfire. Throwing yourself on a tent to prevent its escape as a micro cell touches down.

A canyon camp serene on a fall afternoon, then a wisp of wind and a hush catches your attention, too soon you are in fight or flight mode, scrambling to keep everything together and just as abruptly, serenity falls in the canyon once more. Ruddy ducks and Goldeneyes matting on a high elevation lake. An agate, sunlit amongst leaverites. A heart shaped rock spotted in the shallows, to take home to your wife. Bob, so intent on fishing that he walked off in his flip flops and returned to high laughter from his fishing buddies. Jeff, who have a propensity for bathing while fishing, trudging dejectedly dripping back to the car.

As fly-fisherman faith and hope, is our stock and trade. The possibility of catching a fish, puts a rod in our hands, and we bend that rod to deliver a construct of thread and feathers upon the water in the hope of enticing a fish to take our insect imitation. The amazing thing is we do it in all kinds of weather, at different times of day in different circumstances and in different frames of mind. All of those things change us, that change allows us to grow, we see with new eyes. Every minute of a day is left behind and a new now takes over.

Follow in our ancestors' footsteps and embrace and give thanks for each new day as the sunlight returns and create a new beginning. May your journeys, begin before dawn and may fish come to your fly in the everchanging rivers that you fish.


And may you always fish with those that understand that how many fish you catch, is not nearly so important as who you sit around the fire with.

Hook: Standard wet fly hook, #4 to #10 - 6 & 8 are best

Tail: Red hackle fibers

Body: Back half is yellow chenille, front half is hot orange (not fluorescent) chenille

Hackle: Badger

Wing: White bucktail

#### **MENTORING**


The Mayfly Project is committed to our 1:1 mentor ratio when working with children in foster care because we know they value time with their mentor, and it's the most efficient way to teach fly fishing. The memories made by celebrating successes, working through wind knots together, and giving high fives after letting go a fish, all surmount to essential experiences for our mentees.

#### **CONSERVATION**

During each project outing the children we mentor participate in our Conservation Initiative. We teach the three C's: Catch and Release, Clean Rivers, and Contamination. Our mentees join in a cycle of healing by taking care of the waters we are privileged to experience and the fish we are honored to catch and release.

#### **OUR PROJECTS**

The Mayfly Project's standard program is to mentor a foster child through five sessions we call "stages", just like the life cycle of a Mayfly. Within these stages, the children learn line management, casting techniques, knot tying, some etymology, river safety, mending tactics, hook setting, catch and release tactics, and the value of conservation. At the end of the five stages the child is gifted their own gear to continue to pursue fly fishing.


