Shrimp

There are many food sources for fish that swim from fresh water to the salt. About three years ago Scott Kinney, Eugene, OR started fishing for steelhead with flies that were tied to represent shrimp. In Oregon there are 60 some varieties of shrimp (300 species worldwide). Scott tied this pattern at the 2008 Northwest Fly Tier Expo in Albany, OR. As he tied it, many pictures of shrimp species were shown on his computer. He fishes bays, estuaries and fresh water for steelhead, coho, Chinook, sea run cuts and other fish that might be interested in his shrimp pattern. It works quite well for him.

Fish probably start feeding on shrimp in the bays and estuaries before they head out to sea. At sea there are many more opportunities to feed on nourishing shrimp. So Scott feels he is offering the returning fish something to remind them of home.

#### Materials list:

Hook: For this tie he used a Daiichi hook, size 6, but he uses many other hooks and sizes Thread: Red 6/0 Antenna\*: Crystal flash, pinkish Legs and other front portions of shrimp: Marabou, fleshy pink Weight: Lead eyes (Additional lead wire optional) Shellback: Magic shrimp foil, 1/8th inch wide Rib: Ultra wire red brassy Body: Medium Krystal hackle shrimp, pink

• Apparently the shrimp don't have a real antenna, but many drawings show long fine appendages.

#### Tying steps:

- 1. Tipping the hook downward makes attaching the lead eyes easier. Attach thread at rear of hook and for this hook size attach four 2-inch pieces of Crystal Flash.
- 2. Attach pink marabou to simulate legs over bend of hook
- 3. Attach lead eyes roughly over point of hook. Use little black eyes on the smaller patterns. Always keep the size of eyes proportional to hook size.
- 4. Tie on shellback Magic shrimp foil and red Ultra wire behind the eyes. Also, rotate hook in vise to level the shank
- 5. Sometimes Scott adds lead wire all the way to the hook eye for extra weight. Occasionally he will even put on two layers of lead. Do it before tying on the Krystal hackle. Tie in medium Krystal hackle behind the lead eyes, and wind thread for ward to about one eye width behind the hook's eye.
- 6. Put two wraps of Krystal hackle behind the lead eyes while stroking the fibers back to prevent winding them down. Wrap Krystal hackle around one lead eye, pass it to other side of hook, once around the other lead eye then wrap in front of the lead eyes. This gives full body at back of hook. Now start wrapping forward while stroking the fibers back. Secure behind the eye, and trim excess.
- 7. Trim top fibers about even with the lead eyes and tapering to the front.
- 8. Pull shellback forward.
- 9. Secure the shellback with a couple of thread wraps. Wrap the wire forward, can be counter wrapped or not. The first wrap is over the shellback behind the eyes, then under the eyes to just in front of the eyes. Spiral wire forward to hook eye, secure under the shellback, and trim wire with old scissors. Trim shellback a little more than two eye widths ahead of tie down point
- 10. Hold up shellback and wind thread over wire to cover it for small head. Pick out sides a little then trim sides and front of body a little. Concentrate on tapering down the Krystal hackle toward the tail of the shrimp (eye of the hook). Apply a little head cement on the thread winds under the shellback.

There are also some bigger shrimp to imitate so Scott ties some flies up to size 1/0. These flies usually have extra weight. Please be careful when you cast one of these heavily weighted flies. It hurts when one hits you in the back of the head.

### A Kiss of Spring and the Study of Water

The frothy white caps have been scudding overhead all day. Their predecessors encouraged by the Olympics and the Cascades to let down their waters, left us water rich and sunlight poor. Last time I checked the diviners of weather were predicting two more weeks of rain. The last two days were a welcome respite from the preceding storms. Yesterday and again today our sky was bright blue, with low hung cumulus clouds passing overhead. It was a mite chilly when the clouds eclipsed our heat source. The shadows thrown by the clouds, let the winds cold touch grab ahold. Oh! but when the spring sun emerged and its rays fell upon us, it was a luxurious feeling. Those two days were a spring kiss, stolen between rain drops, all the sweeter for their rarity.

On our walk in the back forty, the dogs raced the wind, pausing here and there as they read today's news. If my sniffer was as sensitive as theirs, I'm sure that I would have been down on all fours reading today earth daily also. The five of us



felt really good outside in the sun, wind, and new grass. I have been selectively packing for the last three weeks to get it all together for my early May fishing trip. Writing lists, gathering fishing gear, assessing, and repairing if warranted, or ordering replacements. Doing the same for the pontoon boats, waders, boots, camping equipment and truck preparation. Two weeks off grid, or back of beyond, requires planning and preparation.

The walk with the dogs in our field of fresh green grass and the sweet kiss of spring on my cheek kicked my need to be in the back of beyond into a higher gear. Just need a few clear days so I can load the truck, with my gear dry. The next two weeks of predicted rain does not bode well for that hope to come true. It is our oldest agrarian dilemma, there is either too little or too much moisture. Guess we will just have to grin and bear it!!

Speaking of moisture, I picked up a book "How to Read Water\*" since almost three quarters (71%) of our home is covered in water, my curiosity was peeked. Our distant mariner ancestors were able to read the water to navigate the oceans of this world. For them, wave patterns were like the landmarks of land travelers. Each island creates wave patterns that are unique to it. These wave patterns migrate far out into the ocean giving guidance to those ancient mariners that learned to read water. They survived and spread to all corners of the earth on the ability to read their environment.

Reading your environment is vital to successful fly-fishing. We need to understand water, fish, and the insects they subsist on. It helps to recognize how the slightest breeze or even the movement of a cloud eclipsing the sun can change everything. Flying insects live on the edge of death they walk a tight rope of survivability. Moisture is vital to their survival; most insects die from dehydration. They are very sensitive to hydration and warmth. A cloud crossing the sun drops the temperature. This slight cooling causes some insects to lose the ability to fly and to fall into the river, where a

knowing trout is expecting them and waiting. A wise fisherman puts this knowledge to good use.

Because of their sensitivity to moisture, insects will move to where the air is moist. It is not coincidental that Mayfly hatches often happen during spring showers. The air above bubbling river water holds more moisture than calmer water and insects will gravitate to the more humid air. A brief aside: (May flies are one of the oldest species on earth; they predate dinosaurs by 150 million years. They spend two years in the mud and live for one day. They emerge from the water with no stomach as they have no time to feed. The females fly to the swarm above the hatch, mate, then land on the water, lay their eggs and die or feed fish, the males fly to land and expire.)

The more we experience and absorb, the better we become at reading water. Rivers move at different speeds, water along the banks move slower than the main channel. Gradients and narrows, speed up flows, flats and width, drop the speed. Fish prefer walking speed water. There are cross currents and waves, riffles, pools, and glides. Soft water lying beside riffles and tail-outs often holds fish. As does the water in front of and behind boulders. Along a river's banks, out crops and obstructions, create eddies, these eddies add to probability of holding fish. Cover and shade up the ante.

If the eddies are strong enough, they will cause a back current, and you will see the bank water moving the opposite direction of the main channel. This backflow area is a good place to wet a fly. Riffles pull oxygen in enriching the fish habitat while transporting food to waiting trout. This oxygen rich water not only benefits the fish but the aquatic insect life as well. Soft-water, high oxygen content and a high insect population, is fish heaven. Your odds of fish being present have increased dramatically.

The art of reading water includes the land around you, the space above the water's surface, the surface itself and what is happening sub-surface. Learning how to read these are pertinent in upping your chances of fish connectivity. Birds are a good indicator that a hatch is about to emerge as they are tuned into insect life cycles, as their survival is dependent on them as a food source. Pay attention to sun and wind patterns, these also influence fish and insect movement and locations. There are many clues to help in the fortunate placement of a fly.

Beneath the water surface don't forget to turn over rocks. On the bottom of rocks hopefully you will find Caddis fly larvae, if you do it means that the water is of high quality, (not polluted or run dry in the past year). If the insect population is healthy, the water should support a healthy fish population. Pay attention to your pre-adjusts, if you cast right-handed, you tend to look for fishing water on your right side, to expand your fishing water pretend to cast with your left hand, more fishable water will begin to appear.

One of the special benefits of fly fishing is fishing without fishing, let's call it watching for the rise. Some will argue this, but seeing a rise can be as rewarding as catching. Like all arts in fly fishing, it takes time and practice to develop this art. Luckily for us, water is very sensitive, the barest touch will cause ripples. Each time a feeding fish takes an insect in their mouth there is a disturbance in the water's surface. Fish rises have been described in various ways such as kissing, sucking, sipping, slashing, flushing, kidney shaped or bulging. All these are related to feeding behavior. All fish feeding is based upon energy expended for nourishment gain. A small fly with no movement will elicit a slow take. A large fly with a lot of movement with a higher energy reward will produce a slashing take. If fish are feeding on the surface, it's time for a dry fly, feeding just below the surface, it is time to tie on an emerger. Fish spotting makes the heart beat a little faster and gives us knowledge.

Nature provides clues to solve her mysteries, as humans in our quest for survival we are driven to understand the clues, signs, and patterns. A good fisherman's success is not based upon luck, it comes from observation and understanding. Understanding also opens up our appreciation of the beauty of our natural world.

This is why I watch the clouds, study the rain, watch leaves blow across the yard, stick my fingers in water puddles, and fish. Fishing is not just catching fish; it is the exploration of life and understanding the connectivity of it all. The next time you visit a river, watch the patterns that form downstream of eddies, turn over rocks, feel the breeze and watch insects. It will enrich your life and give you a deeper understanding of water. I have just scratched the surface of the clues and patterns of finding fish, for more information I recommend the book, How To Read Water by Tristan Gooley.

Too often with our modern convinces, it is easy to become arrogant, and believe that we are more intelligent and knowledgeable than our ancestors. Our ancestors were able to circumnavigate this world both on land and sea, using only their intelligence, and knowledge of nature to get out in the world and back again, that knowledge and understanding insured their survival and our habitation upon this earth. We are standing on the shoulders of giants.






