TAK'S CRYSTAL MIDGE

There are thousands, perhaps hundreds of thousands, of midge (chironomid) patterns. Every time I turn around my friends have a new chironomid pattern that is a better fish catcher than the old one. At the 2009 Federation of Fly Fishers Conclave in Loveland, Colorado I stopped at Rich Takahashi's table to see what he was demonstrating. Guess what, it was another midge pattern. However, this one is a little different. It is different by the way the body and rib are put on and how it is finished with a body coating that is cured with ultra-violet light.

Fishing a chironimid can take many paths. One is to use a sink-tip or full sinking line, let the line and fly sink to where you think the fish are. Sometimes, but not always, a fish finder can help locate these fish. If you don't have one you can start out with usual rule: "At or one foot off the bottom." The retrieve can be a slow hand twist or a variety of strip pause retrieves.

Many anglers do as some say "go bobber fishin" which is another name for using a strike indicator. The length of leader and tippet between the fly and strike indicator puts the fly just above the bottom. All you have to do is watch the bobber, and hope that it does something other than just sit there. If the strike indicator sinks give the rod a long sweeping strike to straighten out the 90 degree bend between the fly line and leader. If you are fishing in 10 to 20 feet of water a quick short strike will not do the job.

A few years ago I was fishing in 5 feet of water and using a slow retrieve. My fly was at 4 feet, and no fish were interested. Then the WIND made me throw a bow tie in the leader, which left the fly at 2 feet below the surface. Fish started hitting the fly on almost every cast. So it was good that I didn't stay near the bottom as the rule dictated.

Also remember with bobber fishing a fish will usually hit as you are pouring a cup of coffee or watching an eagle fly by.

Materials list:

Hook: Tiemco TMC 2302 - size 10 to 22

Thread: Uni 8/0, white

Abdomen and rib: Stretch Magic, 0.5 mm, Olive or Clear

Top Wingcase: Mirage tinsel, large

Side Wingcase: Biots, brown or color to match the natural

Gills: Oral-B ultra floss, white

Protective Coating: Loon Fly Finish Clear

Tying steps:

- 1. Attach thread about three eye widths behind eye.
- 2. Secure Stretch Magic with about two eye widths of thread, and return thread to original tie in point.
- 3. Put some tension on the Stretch Magic and wind it rearward to a point beyond the barb.
- 4. Hold up the Streatch Magic and color it with a dark color marker. On this fly Rick used a red marker.
- 5. Spiral the rib forward, secure and trim.
- 6. Attach clear tinsel on top of hook and wind thread forward. Attach a brown biot on each side of hook. Have the concave curve on the biots to the outside
- 7. Wind thread forward to one eye width from the eye. Then use a dark permanent marker, and color all the way around the thorax.
- 8. Bring the tinsel forward, secure, then move biots forward and secure. The biots represent the developing wingcase.
- 9. Trim off excess tinsel and biots.
- 10. Attach breathing gills with a figure eight wind at the front of the wingcase. Rick used poly yarn until a friend told him about Oral-B ultra floss.
- 11. Whip finish behind the gills, trim thread and trim gills short.
- 12. Coat abdomen and wingcases with Loon Fly Finish. Expose to ultra violet light for a few seconds until the plastic sets. Several uv-cure products indicate that the plastic will cure in direct sunlight.

However, it will not cure if the sunlight is filtered by glass.

This mimics the chironomids that are more transparent than the solid black, olive, etc. species we frequently see. The acrylic plastic sets much quicker than any of the solvent evaporation cements. If the Stretch Magic is not in your fly shop; look for it in craft or scrapbook supply stores. I guess the message here is to explore a little for material that can be used for fly tying. The fish don't know that you didn't find it in a fly shop.

The Hours Grow Shorter as the Days Go-By

Our waning fall sky exhibits more starlight than sunlight. Oh! But when the sun shine's, those are treasured hours. Water rich marine air from the Pacific Ocean and Salish Sea, creeps inland, making itself at home amongst the evergreens of the Cascade Mountain Range. Mount Tahoma, King of the Cascades has donned a dense grey blanket of clouds, and when the blanket settled around his majestic shoulders, he reached back and pulled it up over his head, ready for his winter nap. Bright fall colors are falling down, as rain and wind gleans them from limbs, branch, and brow. Dampness touches all. The earth seems to fall in upon itself as it enwraps what it touches. There are no dry and desiccated bones here, the earth is a giant sponge, continually absorbing and renewing itself.

Every atom here is in transition, the cycle of life on full display. New growth springs forth from the fallen. A nursery log provides the go juice for the next generation. A miss-placed and forgotten yard rake, hidden in a grass choked nook, missed by mower, and weed wacker; when found, the wooden handle was well on its way to becoming compost and the metal tines had transformed into rusted yard art. From plot tiller to new soil and rusted accent relic.

The color of dampness in the Pacific Northwest is green. Shades of winter green to be precise, all things west of the Cascades occupying space in the water shed of Puget Sound, acquire a bit of the green. Cars, buildings, roads, paving stones,

roofs, etc., if it sits outside for any length of time it develops a green patina. Without human intervention it will all be overtaken and swallowed by green growth, from the minute growth of lichen and moss to massive logs stretching so far into the sky, the tops are hard to see, Western Red Cedar, Western Hemlock, Sitka Spruce, and Douglas-Fir.

What's the old saying? Oh! Yes, a rolling stone gathers no moss. No movement around these parts produces green growth. Woe be the tool, that is set aside and missed in the pick-up, its useful lifetime is diminished. The expanse of winter green colors is extraordinary. Each plant, rock, car, building etc... shares the human identified color spectrum green, but each displays their own unique hue and tone of green. I need to add a qualifier here, those of you who are color blind are exempt from this description. Yes Mr. Gallagher, you are excused. Stand easy.

Ours are not the only eyes that view this world. The colors displayed by plants as seen by insects blows the human visible color spectrum out of the water. The plant color spectrum shown to insects is awe inspiring. Want to widen your view of the world? Take the time to investigate the plant colors as seen by insects. Your world view will shift dramatically.

A fall storm is moving through, leaves and limbs stripped from the trees fly through one's sightline, at this wind speed, most are carried horizontally. Copious amounts of rain hits with enough force to bounce. Around three AM the storm unleashed a river of wind. Its strength and force hammered our siding and rattled the windows, it pulled me from my warm blankets. My first thoughts were of the greenhouse doors. I had just straightened them; a third repair session was not a wished-for result.

I threw on some clothes and rushed outside to secure them. In leaving the house I also noticed that our new tarp covered carport was halfway into the driveway. The carport had wrenched its anchors, as the ropes parted it began to migrate, another un-whished for result, made more import by how bummed my grandson would be at the loss of his new and unused semi-dry covered work area.

Once I had the doors on the greenhouse secured, I called Nolan from his bed to assist me with the arrant carport. The would-be carport/kite was threatening to fly away, looking to get tangled in a fence line or deposited in dispersed scrap piles across ours and our neighbor's property. It was touch and go, as Nolan and I hung on as it pushed us

around. The sustained wind gust finally subsided enough that we could replace the severed anchor lines and add additional restraints. Was it pretty? No, we grabbed what was close and made do.

We even backed the truck up to it, to keep it corralled. We returned to our slumbers, relatively secure in the knowledge that it would still be here in the morning. That desired outcome did come true.

It has rained hard most of the day, a rain heavy and steady enough to have caused flash flooding in the canyon lands of Utah and Arizona. Oh! It floods here frequently, right now we are early into our rainy season and Ma earth is still refilling her reservoirs. Here and now the giant sponge of mother earth is absorbing it all. Yes, there are puddles but no major runoff, the rivers and streams will be freshening and our anadromies fish will begin to leave the Pacific Ocean and Salish Sea to spawn in the creeks, streams, and rivers of the west. Now we wait for the tribes and fish and game to make a call. I am poised with anticipation, hoping for good returns. The numbers are disappointingly low though. If wishes, were fishes, we would all have a fry. Fish or fry I will find a way to be back-of-begone.

In the busy days of spring and summer, introspection is a lost art, pushed to the back burner as we fling ourselves into our chosen activities. In contrast, fall and winter are more congenial to introspection and reflection. At my age the hours have grown shorter as the days go by and with the slowing of the season it is easier to let it be, to give into the day, and let it surround me. To embrace the rain and not wish for some other weather. To build the green house steps and relish the challenges and not wish I was somewhere else.

Time and again we submit to the helter-skelter, to things we think we need, and miss what is already here. We falter in our remembering, and forget to close our eyes, to stop and listen, to feel alive and know that nothing is missing. We do not need a reason to smell the rain, to lose ourselves in the clouds, to feel the kiss of the ocean spray, to be amazed at the colors of green, or the rainbow of color flashing on the side of a trout or the rainbow left in the wake of a storm. Have you witnessed the ring your dry fly produces, as it settles on the water and then seen another ring form within your ring, created by the trout when it sips your fly? Have you watched the descent of a helicopter seed pod, from its separation from a branch high in the maple tree, through its descent, to its embrace by the earth? Have you been entranced in the flight of a bumblebee or dragonfly investigating a field of wildflowers or the bull rushes in a pond? If you have, good on ya, if not, now is the best time to take on new adventures.

In the pursuit of valuation of things and monetary gain, cataracts begin to cloud our eyes. As children we greeted each day with wonder, our senses were wide open, and we interacted with taste, touch, and sight. Each new discovery infused us with joy. It is time again to re-embrace our wondrous nature, to reacquaint ourselves with the child we hold within. To reevaluate our value hierarchy. Sun's up, the world survives into another day, grab a hold of where you are, not where you think you should be. Taste the wind, smell the sun and drink in the colors of the day. Open your peepers and let them truly see, do not just identify, and move on. Look deeper, breath deeper and feel deeper. Labels and classification box us in, they limit our growth.

We are prisoners of our own prejudices; those are heavy chains to pack around. Our early ancestors lived in better balance with our earth, in our defense we have been heavily marketed elective distractions. With the world entering a shift in the environment, it is time to take a closer look at those elective distractions. All endeavors should adopt these guidelines: A project must improve the environment or at least not harm it, it must help all of humanity not just a chosen few, and it must be based upon sound economics. A three-legged stool is the most stable in an uneven environment, it can always find balance. Only when all three legs are on the ground should a project go forward, Earth, People, and Money are equal, one cannot take precedent over the others.

The holidays are upon us, this week Thanksgiving and soon Christmas, Hanaka and a New Year. All mile posts in the circle of the year. Circles within circles. In this season of giving thanks and remembrances, I thank you my readers, without you my life would be poorer. Because of you I strive to be a better storyteller, you encourage me to keep looking deeper into human existence and share my interactions with living. As a conversant fly-fisherman, the tackle I carry while fishing has been pruned and pared down. Experience has taught me that less is more. I apply that same principle to the rest of my life, I try carrying the least amount of baggage as possible, sometimes successfully.



Tail: Bright Breen Bucktail

Body: Pale pink spun fur Rib: Flat silver tinsel Throat: Short pink bucktail

Wing: Equal amounts of white bucktail of first level Pink bucktail on second level and bright green

bucktail on the third. Over this a barred badger

(grey squirrel).

Cheek: Jungle cock (optional)




