Fly Fishing International Fly of the Month April 2010 Smoke Jumper

To me this is an interesting pattern that is not too difficult to tie and it catches fish, both good objectives. Carolyn Sells tied this fly at the 2009 Washington State Council Fly Fishing Fair, Ellensburg, WA May 1st and 2nd. Carolyn didn't talk about the history of the pattern while she tied it, so I did an internet search on "Smoke Jumper fly pattern." Guess what? Other patterns with the same name showed up. It turns out that Mike Hoiness, Yellowstone Fly Goods, tied the original one as a crippled midge emerger. Yellowstone Fly Goods, Billings, MT is a distributor, and they have marketed their Smoke Jumper for four years to fly shops in Montana, Idaho, Wyoming, etc.. Their flies are tied on Tiemco 2488 or DaiRiki 125 hooks with a scud back body, CDC shell back and wing and peacock herl thorax.

Now back to Carolyn's Smoke Jumper. Hers is a Hackle Stacker pattern. That is kind of obvious when you look at the fly above. The original Hackle Stacker is a mayfly emerger pattern. Bob Quigley is often cited as the developer of this fly although the technique can also be attributed to Jim Cramer and the late Ned Long. As with any technique that produces great trout catching flies there are many variations for mayflies, midges and other insects. The springtime websites in the Montana and Idaho talk about using it to attract fish feeding on midges. Naturally, they recommend smaller sizes 18 - 20. Your job is to look at the insects trout are feeding on in your favorite stream, and tie the sizes and colors needed. Fish it like any other dry fly or emerger: Floating line, long leader and drag free float. The smaller flies are hard to see so some anglers string it behind a more visible pattern like a hopper or parachute with a Hi-Viz wing. Then if you see a splash behind the visible pattern, strike gently.

Materials List:

Hook: Tiemco TMC 2312 sizes 14-22 TMC 200R is OK for smaller sizes

Thread: White 14/0

Body: Stretch tubing, micro size

Hackle: Grizzly

Tying steps:

- 1. Bend the front part of the hook downward a little as shown. Be careful to not damage the hook when you do this. Use smooth jaw pliers or the jaws of the vise. Serrated jaw pliers can damage the hook so it will break when a nice fish hits. Believe me, I know.
- 2. Wind thread on hook from eye to the bend you put in shank.
- 3. Secure Stretch Tubing at the bend you put in the shank, spiral thread tightly rearward to a point over the barb. Spiral thread forward to front of Stretch Tubing and half hitch. Now you can put the thread out of the way on a post, etc. as Carolyn did.
- 4. Pull the Stretch Tubing tightly, wrap it forward to the bent shank and secure. Trim excess tubing.
- 5. With a red permanent marker, paint rear 1/3rd or 1/4th of Stretch Tubing all the way around hook.
- 6. Use a black permanent marker to paint over some of the red and the rest of the Stretch Tubing.
- 7. Tie a loop of 5X tippet at front of body. Make the loop of the proper length to fit on a gallows tool. (Although not as convenient, Step 10 can be done without a gallows tool. Make the loop short enough so it can be held with the first finger of the left hand, and you will be able to wrap the hackle with the right hand.)
- 8. Put monofilament loop on gallows tool.
- 9. Select a hackle with barbs (fibers) of a standard length for the hook size. The barb length should be equal to 1-1/2 times the gap width. Attach to hook in front of monofilament loop with long part of hackle to rear.
- 10. Wrap hackle 6 turns up and 6 turns down, and secure around monofilament loop.
- 11. Wind thread to eye. Take loop off gallows tool, and spread loop to move the hackle down to hook.
- 12. Stroke barbs back, pull monofilament loop forward through the barbs and put a couple of thread wraps over it. Keep barbs out of the way to prevent trapping them, pull the loop hard forward, secure loop and wind thread to eye. Trim excess monofilament loop.
- 13. Whip finish, trim thread and paint head with black marker.

Closing comments: This pattern is a combination of two other patterns the original Smoke Jumper and the original Hackle Stacker. It catches fish, and the tying technique can be used to tie a variety of patterns including blue wing olives and pale morning duns. You might want to use a smaller material for the body on small flies. Invent your own to solve that special fishing problem. With smaller flies, like 22, 24 and 26, some tiers will use 7X or 8X tippet for the monofilament loop. These patterns catch fish so tie up a few, and go fishing.

Steelhead Weather

The back of my pickup is a damp tangled mess, it's my own damn fault. Although wet weather played its part. As I contemplated the task before me, I went back to the end of February, our Steelhead fishing journey started wet and finished wet. The silver lining was ideal weather conditions for steelhead fishing. A freshening river, light rain, and clear water. Fishable river levels and flows at just the right amount of speed to get the fly down and presentable. Our trip had been simmering since December, but abundant amounts of rain and high-water levels kept pushing it back. Greg was keeping his eye on the weather and Sean on water levels. A window opened up and we went for it. We set up camp beside the Bogie, (Bogachiel) and headed upriver in search of winter steelhead. Steelhead numbers are down and only a few of the Olympic Peninsula (OP) rivers are open for fishing. A few is better than none in previous years.

The tri-surface (asphalt, gravel, & dirt) access road wound inland following the contours of the river valley and Olympic mountains. We skirted beaver ponds and splashed through road puddles as we left human settlement further behind. The further we traveled; the road's surface reclaimed its birth incarnation. The access road ended at a bull dozed cut in the side of a hill. The parking area was no longer a rough cut, time and rain have softened its bulldozed features. Just enough vehicle use has prevented its complete absorption back into its natural rain forest state. The OP is a world of damp, thick growth, tall and massive timber, and concealing undergrowth, you leave the trail at your own peril, cross country travel can only be accomplished by following Elk trails and those contain pitfalls. Already wearing our waders and boots we slid out of the pickup and donned our waterproof packs and with rods in hand, we



descended through the encompassing rainforest into the Bogachiel river valley. The rain forest is a wild place in constant change, but its change is cloaked by constant new growth, its scars healed over and covered by new green growth. Splintered limbs and fallen giants are soon covered with seedlings, moss, ferns, and fungi all quickly soften the appearance of the broken and shattered.

The river valley presents a different wild. Here raw change is evident wherever your gaze falls. Frequent highwater events tear new paths, constantly altering the landscape through which it passes. Do not count on the trail you used last year or even last month taking you where it once did. Your next step may drop you into the river. The high bank is now a river bar, or the perfect run is now a log jam, freshly deposited giants require long detours or maybe a new bridge to a new favorite run. Monster trees that are giants to us are mere match sticks when tossed about by the forces of nature. These behemoth trees are strewn like straw amongst displaced boulders, swales, and promontories. Eventually the trees will make it to the sea as periodic flushes push out the old an deposit the new.

Cross country travel across a gravel bar to the river can be as difficult as a walk through a rainforest. Point A does not always lead to B you may have to go to M and back to J to get to B. What looks accessible may not be as it appears. Each step must be judged and executed with care, rocks, roots, barbed vines and fallen limbs all conspire to pull you down. In this wild and beautiful environment, you earn each journey you undertake. No wonder Steelhead are powerful and smart, this is their home, and it has made them strong and wise. This is a fish that can make multiple trips to the ocean. It returns a stunning chrome color looking for food and redds to reproduce. They will repeat this circle many times if we allow them too. On this day, low clouds intermingled with the dark-green cedars, hemlocks, firs and gray splotched, white barked, alders. The rain forest and river valley are quite, muted by the low-lying clouds, the only song we hear is the river, our footsteps in the sand and gravel of the river bar, and gently falling rain. Steelhead weather, but the perfect atmosphere for steelhead sends chills through our wet rain jackets, lucky for us, hiking, wading, fishing, and our packed lunch produced enough self-generated body heat and gets us through our Steelheading day.

Over two days of Steelheading we three piscatorial aficionados manage to ascertain the presence of steelhead in the Bogie. Our survey equipment 12-foot, 7/8wt. Spey rods, 10-foot T10 sinking line and three feet of 15lb tippet and tube flies. With this setup we pursued magnificent fish, but alast he landing of a chrome beauty was not to be.

Between the three of us we attained, a hook-up with a jump, a take, a nibble, and spotted a rolling fish. In conversations with a few other steelhead fishermen, our brief fish contacts put us at high stick, for our two days of fishing. In a low return year, just the opportunity to say hello to this beautiful aquatic being, is welcomed and appreciated.

After a day descending and climbing river valley access trails, wading, backtracking, winter Steelheading and dampness, dry clothes, dinner, music, a campfire, a day's recounting with friends and a wee dram of the "water of life" (whiskey) our evenings quickly restored our depleted energy supply, and we were ready to do it all over again. Whiskey's Latin roots - ((Irish/Galic), Uisce beatha, Uisce meaning - water, beatha meaning - life, over time Usice beatha was shortened and is now pronounce Whiskey), On the morning, we broke camp, it rained all night and throughout camp disassembly and packing. To minimize water exposure, all equipment was hastily flung into the pickup, my usual packing routine was abandoned. My hope was that on my return home that I would have time to air everything out and reorganize. It was a false hope, I only had time to unload and get everything spread out undercover so that it could dry and opened the tent to let it air and buttoned it back up before the rain returned.

Now three weeks later my wished for, dry spell had finally materialized. I now had time to put my house/truck back in order. All time in the back-of-beyond requires preparation and clean up. When I pulled open my kitchen and storage drawers, I had a site of clean up to do. Wet setups and tear downs are part of the visits to the OP. It comes with the territory. I admit I was a little dismayed at the mess of stakes and ropes that needed to be detangled. Take your worst wind knot and multiply it by a factor of five, add water, dirt, twigs, fir needles, and about twenty



ropes in various sizes from three-feet to fifteen-feet and a plethora of galvanized spikes and you will understand my dismay. An hour of labor sorted the problem. The rest of the truck took a little longer. The upside, it was done in spring sunshine and the truck, kitchen, gear, and my water of life stash is replenished, and all is ready for our next fishing trip in May. Woohoo!!

Thank you, Sean, and Greg, for showing me new country, new water, and as always for our time around the campfire.

Ps: Dear readers, I lost all the pictures I took on this trip, these pictures are from a previous trip to the OP on a different, now closed river, but same environment. On this trip we often remarked on how much the two rivers resembled each other although the Bogie is rockier, and we lost more flies.

Hook: #6 or 8, 2x or 3x long (#8, 3xl seemed best)

Tail: Brown marabou (quite long)

Body: Brown Mohair

When the mohair is wrapped on the hook shank, use a dubbing needle to pick out the hairs as you tie and keep them from getting under the main body of the yarn. Lead may be wrapped on the front part of the hook to make the pattern dip and rise on a <u>slow</u> retrieve.


